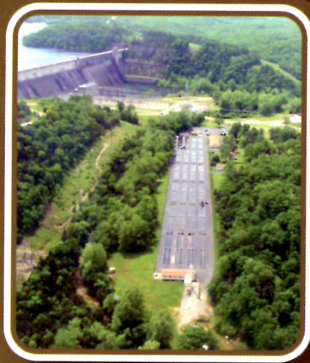


Norfolk National Fish Hatchery



Visit the largest national fish hatchery, which was established in 1957 when the Norfolk Dam changed the North Fork River to a tailwater release stream. Approximately 500,000 pounds of Rainbow, Brown and Cutthroat trout are raised and released annually. The hatchery

accommodates 280,000 visitors each year. Visitors are able to tour the fish runs to view trout from fingerlings to trophy trout. Fish food is available along with tours and visitor's center provided by the Friends of the Norfolk National Fish Hatchery. www.norforkhatcheryfriends.org

Try your luck fishing on the world famous White River!



Home of the state record Rainbow at 19 pounds and the state record Cutthroat at 9 pounds. Cold, clear water. Beautiful scenery and lots of fish! Opportunities abound for floating or bank fishing.

Disabled anglers and youth under 16 can fish for Lunker Trout in Dry Run Creek, which runs from the Norfolk Hatchery to the North Fork River.

Handicapped accessible boardwalk and fish platforms line the bank.



The Wolf House



View the oldest public structure in Arkansas, the historic Jacob Wolf House, built in 1829 when Arkansas was still a territory. Originally built as a court house, the structure became home to the large Wolf family after the county seat was moved. Jacob Wolf died here in 1863. Several of his family members are buried in the Wolf Family Cemetery located south of Norfolk near Red's Landing.

Other sites listed on the National Register of Historic Places in Norfolk include the Davis House in 1926, the Horace Mann School Historic District and the North Fork Bridge which is on Highway 5 over the North Fork River.



Nearby Lake Norfolk...

provides 22,000 acres of pristine water for water sports of all kinds as well as excellent fishing. Scuba divers can spear fish for lunkers. This lake is well known in angler's circles for the huge striped bass and large walleye. There is year round fishing with no closed limits. Many campgrounds as well as resorts and cabins are available in the area. Quarry Park near the dam, provides camping, playgrounds, boat access and swimming.

Pioneer Day Festival...



Norfolk celebrates the heritage of the community each May with a Pioneer Day Festival. Held the 3rd Saturday in May, it features Civil War reenactors, tours of the historic Wolf House, music, food and fun! Also includes a parade and other family activities.
